





His expertise is in the area of Curriculum Development, and Implementation. He currently serves on several Governing Boards of various tertiary educational institutions and organizations.



Prof. Augustine Ocloo Deputy Director-General, GTEC

Prof. Augustine Ocloo is currently the Acting Deputy Director-General of the Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC).

He is a Professor of Biochemistry and Biochemical Pharmacotoxicology. He holds a PhD from the University of Cambridge (2005) and a Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Ghana (1998).

He has held several key academic and administrative positions,

including Dean of the School of Biological Sciences, University of Ghana (August 2019 – February 2025); Executive Director of the Centre for Plant Medicine Research, Mampong-Akwapim (October 2015 – June 2019); and Head of the Department of Biochemistry, Cell and Molecular Biology at the University of Ghana (August 2011 – July 2013).

He currently serves on the boards of the Commission for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (CTVET) and the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment (NaCCA), and has previously served on the Governing Board of the Food and Drugs Authority. Prof. Ocloo has authored over 50 peer-reviewed research articles in reputable journals.

Prof. Jophus Anamuah-Mensah Chairman, JoTED Editorial Advisory Board

Prof. Jophus Anamuah-Mensah is a distinguished educator, reformist, and thought leader in African education. He has served in several senior academic and leadership roles, including Head of the Department of Science Education, Dean of the Faculty of Education, and Pro-Vice-Chancellor at the University of Cape Coast (UCC).

In 1998, he became Principal and later the founding Vice-Chancellor of the University of Education, Winneba (UEW), the first university in Africa solely

dedicated to teacher education. Over his nine-year tenure, he led the transformation of UEW into a fully autonomous institution and positioned it as a hub for innovation in teacher education. He also established the Centre for School and Community Science and Technology Studies (SACOST) in 2000, National Centre for Research into Basic Education, and launched the Department of Early Childhood Care and Development in 2005, which significantly advanced Ghana's early childhood education sector.


Prof. Anamuah-Mensah has been at the forefront of Ghana's major education reforms. He led the development of Ghanas Education Strategic Plan 2018-2030. He played a central role in introducing Early Childhood Development (ECD) into the formal school curriculum, championed science, technology, innovation, and skills development in schools, and was instrumental in developing the blueprint for an open university for Ghana.

As Executive Chair of Teacher Education in Sub-Saharan Africa (TESSA), he has collaborated with the Open University (UK) and over 100 African educators to create free, high-quality teacher professional development resources, benefiting hundreds of thousands of teachers and their pupils in 13 African countries.

Prof. Anamuah-Mensah is the Board Chair of Transforming Teaching, Education and Learning (T-TEL) Ghana, where he has contributed to Ghana's National Teacher Education Curriculum Framework and the reform of preservice teacher education. His expertise has shaped the design and rollout of Ghana's four-year B.Ed. teacher education programmes, ensuring alignment with the National Teachers' Standards and supporting quality assurance systems across Colleges of Education and universities. He continues to guide T-TEL's work in enhancing the professional preparation of teachers, integrating gender and inclusion principles, and embedding practical, school-based training in teacher education.

For his exceptional contributions, Prof. Anamuah-Mensah was awarded the Order of the Volta (Companion) in 2006, one of Ghana's highest national honours.

He is also Chairman of the Governing Council of Zenith University College and Chair of the International Advisory Board at ESDEV Foundation Africa.



Prof. Mohammed Salifu Member, JoTED Editorial Advisory Board

Prof. Mohammed Salifu was the foundation Director-General of the Ghana Tertiary Education Commission (GTEC). Was also Executive Secretary of the National Council for Tertiary Education (NCTE) in which roles he supervised important reforms and regulation of tertiary education in Ghana.

He oversaw the transformation of polytechnics into technical universities as

well as transformation of Training Colleges into tertiary level, degree awarding Colleges of Education.

He was instrumental in driving policy for the institution of post-retirement contracts for academic staff and legislation for setting up of the national research fund. Prof. Salifu is a Professor of Transport Engineering at KNUST, a Fellow and former Vice President of the Ghana Institution of Engineering and was for several years Editor-in-Chief for the institution's technical journal.

He holds a PhD in Transport Engineering from the University of Newcastle upon Tyne, UK and his research interests covers traffic engineering and management, accident prediction modeling, transport logistics as well as sustainable urban transport options.

Over the years, Prof Edu-Buandoh, has shown great interest in the lives of many young adults. She is a philanthropist


and a keen supporter of female education. Her focus has been in supporting young female students to complete tertiary education and mentoring them to acquire leadership skills.

Beyond academia, she was appointed Chairperson of the Presidential Committee on Emoluments of Article 71 Office Holders in 2016, and in June 2025, nominated as Ghana's High Commissioner to Canada.

Prof. George Kofi Toku Oduro is a distinguished academic and researcher with a strong background in educational leadership and policy. He holds a PhD in Educational Leadership from the University of Cambridge, United Kingdom. His doctoral research focused on leadership practices in basic schools in Ghana. He also holds a Master of Philosophy (MPhil) in Educational Planning from the University of Cape Coast, Ghana, and a Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) degree from the same institution.

Prof. Oduro has had an illustrious career at the University of Cape Coast, serving in various academic and administrative capacities. He served as Acting Provost of the College of Distance Education (UCC), Pro-Vice Chancellor of the University of Cape Coast, Director of the Institute for

Educational Planning and Administration (IEPA), Dean of the School of Graduate Studies and Head of Department.

He is currently a Professor of Educational Leadership at the Institute for Educational Planning and Administration (IEPA), a UNESCO Category II Centre of Excellence at the University of Cape Coast. Professor Oduro's research interests are centred on improving educational systems, particularly in developing countries. His work focuses on educational leadership and management, School improvement and effectiveness, Teacher motivation and professional development, educational policy analysis and implementation, and Gender and equity issues in education. His research has been instrumental in shaping educational policies and practices in Ghana and beyond.

He has published extensively in reputable peer-reviewed journals and contributed to several books on educational leadership and policy. Some of his notable publications include: Perspectives on Educational Leadership in Ghana: A Case Study of Headteachers in Basic Schools (Journal of Educational Administration), Leadership for School Improvement: The Role of Headteachers in Ghanaian Basic Schools" (International Journal of Leadership in Education) and Teacher Motivation and Professional Development in Sub-Saharan Africa" (African Journal of Educational Management).

He has received several awards for his research and leadership, including: Outstanding Researcher Award from the University of Cape Coast, Excellence in Educational Leadership Award from the African Council for Educational Administration and Management (ACEAM). Professor Oduro is experienced in coordinating education-related international partnership research and capacity-strengthening projects.

He is a Fellow of the Cambridge Commonwealth Trust, the All-Saints' Educational Trust, UK, the Association of Commonwealth Universities, the Australian Leadership Awards Fellowships (ALAF) Scheme and the Galilee International Management Institute, (Isreal).

Prof. Oduro is an asset to the global education community who continues to inspire, influence and shape the future of education in Africa and beyond. He is currently special advisor to the Minister for Education.



Prof. Emmanuel Thompson Member, JoTED Editorial Advisory Board

Prof. Emmanuel Thompson is a Professor of Actuarial Science and Statistics and the Coordinator of the Actuarial Science Program at Southeast Missouri State University, USA. He holds a Ph.D. in Statistics with a specialization in Actuarial Science and an M.Sc. in Actuarial Science from the University of Calgary, Canada. He also earned a B.Sc. (Hons.) in Statistics (First Class) from the University of Cape Coast, Ghana, and an HND in Statistics (First Class) from Koforidua Technical University, Ghana.

Prof. Thompson brings over 20 years of combined academic and insurance industry experience across

Ghana, Canada, and the United States. His expertise spans actuarial science, statistics, and data science. His research interests include actuarial risk modeling, data mining and predictive modeling, and the integration of technology in mathematics and statistics education.

He has published extensively in peer-reviewed journals and is passionate about mentoring students for actuarial exams, graduate studies, data science competitions, and careers in actuarial science, statistics, and data science.

He is a member of the Institute and Faculty of Actuaries (UK), the Actuarial Society of Ghana, and the American Statistical Association.



Dr. Sam Awuku *Member, JoTED Editorial Advisory Board*

Dr. Awuku has over 30 years of working in the education and development sectors across sub-Saharan Africa and Europe with extensive experience in educational leadership, organizational development, education technology, quality assurance in education, inclusive education, foundational learning, curriculum development, mathematics education, and public engagement. Dr. Awuku holds Teachers' Certificate with distinction and BA (Honours) both from the University of Cape Coast; MA in Inclusive Education from the University of Reading, UK; MBA (Leadership and Management of NGOs) from Trinity College, USA; MA in Education Programme with mathematics focus from London South Bank University, UK; Public Leadership Credential from Harvard Kennedy School, Harvard University, USA; LLM in International Law from the University of Law, UK; a Ph.D. in Education Technology and Development Policy from the UCL Institute of Education, UK. He is a member of

the Institute of Directors, UK, a Fellow of The Chartered College of Teaching, UK, and a Chartered Mathematics Teachers, Institute of Mathematics and Its Applications, UK.

Aside Dr. Awuku's work in transforming education systems continentally, he played a significant role in the implementation of the Transforming Teacher Education and Learning (T-TEL) project in Ghana from 2014 to 2020 as the Key Adviser for Policy, Leadership, Institutional Development, ICT, and Communications. This role positioned him to provide strategic advice to the Ministry and its agencies (NCTE, NaCCA, NAB, NIB, GES, and NTC) on school curriculum and related policies, systems strengthening and improvement planning, quality assurance, leadership in teacher education institutions, ICT use for education to include emergency remote teaching and learning (during COVID-19). Sam introduced improvement planning into the Colleges of Education, led the introduction of Standards-Based Curriculum at the Pre-Tertiary level of Education and the development of the Primary School Standards-Based Curriculum.

Some other innovations introduced and led by Dr. Awuku aimed at improving the institutional capacity of education regulatory bodies are the development and dissemination of the National Professional Education Leadership Qualification Framework and the related course material, Quality Assurance and Accreditation Assessment Instrument, National Teacher Education Assessment Policy, School Partnership Framework for Supported Teaching in Schools (Teaching Practicum) and the School Inspection Evaluation Framework and Tools. He has taught across all phases of the educational system in Ghana and outside of Ghana. Dr. Awuku has served on the councils of the University of Cape Coast and the Ghana Communication Technology University. Dr. Awuku's practical education experience cut across all phases; pre-tertiary, tertiary and systems.

At the end of T-TEL project, Dr. Awuku was instrumental in establishing Transforming Teaching, Education & Learning (T-TEL), a Ghanaian owned Non-Governmental Organisation, and initiated the Mastercard Foundation Funding to the NGO. This funding is enabling T-TEL to continue to support the Ministry of Education in implementing its secondary education policy. Sam as the Principal Technical Adviser of T-TEL has been responsible for Leadership, ICT for Education, Institutional Development and Secondary Education initiatives aimed at ensuring that senior high school learners are adequately prepared for further studies, world of work and responsible adult life. He is the Head of Country Engagement for the Education Development Centre's Learning Generations Initiative with Ghana, Kenya, Rwanda, Tanzania, Sierra Leon, Nigeria and Botswana as focus countries. Dr. Awuku was one of the eight key education experts appointed by President John Mahama in February 2025 to review Ghana Education system through a national forum and make recommendations for improvement. He was very instrumental in ensuring that report of the committee to the president was timely and of highest quality and implementable.

Continentally, Dr. Awuku led and or play significant role in multi-million projects that were aimed at improvising life chances of young people. Notably among them were the Innovative Pedagogies Project Lead (covering Ghana, Rwanda and Kenya) of the International Commission for Financing Education Opportunities (now Learning Generation Initiative) in USA, and the Girls' Education Challenge implemented in Ghana, Nigeria and Kenya. He was the Global Director for Centre Development and Public Engagement for the African Institute for Mathematical Science – Next Einstein Initiative (AIMS-NEI) Foundation during which he led the Centre development efforts of the Foundation. He engaged with country ministers (especially Ghana, Rwanda, Tanzania, United Kingdom, South Africa, Kenya, Nigeria and Cameroon), Ambassadors (Rwanda in the UK, Tanzania in the UK, Canada in Tanzania, Nigeria in Canada), prime ministers (Tanzania, Canada and the UK) and presidents (Ghana, Tanzania and Rwanda) leading to the establishment of AIMS centres in Tanzania and Rwanda, while improving government partnership for AIMS-Centres in Ghana, Cameroon, South Africa and Senegal.

He holds a Ph.D. in Music from the University of Ghana and has received postdoctoral training under the African Humanities Programme (AHP) of the American Council of Learned Societies (ACLS). His academic journey has been enriched through prestigious international fellowships and

exchanges, including the Erasmus+ Programme at Dublin City University (Ireland) and a fellowship at the University of Rochester in New York, USA.

Prof. Amuah has served in various academic and administrative capacities, both locally and internationally. He has been a Visiting Professor at Augustana College (USA), Dublin City University (Ireland), and the University of Education, Winneba (Ghana). At the University of Ghana, he has held key leadership roles including Head of Department and Acting Dean of the School of Performing Arts. He has also served as an external examiner and lecturer at several universities across Ghana and the African continent, and has contributed actively to numerous academic boards, accreditation panels, and curriculum review committees.

A prolific author and composer, Professor Amuah's scholarly work spans choral hybridity, indigenous compositional systems, liturgical code-switching, and the sociocultural impact of music in religious and public life in Ghana. He has published over 50 peer-reviewed journal articles and book chapters, and co-authored more than 10 educational and choral management books. His notable publications include *Performing Arts Education for Ghanaian Basic Schools (Books 7–9), An Introduction to Music for Schools, Colleges and Universities, A Practical Guide to Contemporary Choral Management, Theory of Music: The Simplest Approach, Songs for Christmas, and Passion: An Anthology of Sacred Songs for Palm Sunday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday.*

As a composer and performer, his work draws deeply on Ghanaian traditional musical idioms, integrating rich rhythmic patterns and melodic textures with Western choral forms. His compositions have been performed both locally and internationally, including at the Eastman Choral Festival (USA). He has produced several choral anthologies and audio recordings, such as *Hymns and Their Meaning*, which have been broadcast on national and ecclesiastical platforms.

In the area of examining and adjudication, Professor Amuah serves as Chief Examiner in Creative Arts & Design (Performing Arts) for Ghana's Basic Education Certificate Examination, Chief Examiner for Music at the Senior High School and College of Education levels, and as an External Examiner for several institutions including the University of Education, Winneba; University of Cape Coast; Wisconsin International University College; University for Development Studies; and the International Baccalaureate (UK). He has supervised and examined numerous MPhil and PhD theses across institutions in Ghana and abroad, particularly in areas such as compositional technique, choral analysis, intercultural performance, and music identity.

Prof. Ebenezer Owusu-Sekyere Member, JoTED Editorial Working Board



Prof. Hope Pius Nudzor is a professor of critical education policy and implementation analysis. He is currently the Director of the Institute for Educational Research and Innovation Studies (IERIS) at the University of Education, Winneba. Before this, he was the Director of Research, Innovation and Outreach at the Institute for Educational Planning and Administration (IEPA), a UNESCO Category II Centre of Excellence at the University of Cape Coast for five (5) years.

Prof. Nudzor holds B.A. degree (with First Class Honours) in Linguistics and Swahili from the University of Ghana in 2001. He also holds graduate degrees in MSc. in Management and Leadership in Education; and PhD in Educational and

Professional Studies, both from the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow, Scotland in 2004 and 2007 respectively.

After he obtained his PhD, Professor Nudzor has pre-occupied himself with research concerning universal primary education (UPE) provision and delivery for learners from disadvantaged and/or marginalized settings. His PhD thesis, which was on the free compulsory universal basic education (fCUBE) policy implementation in Ghana, for example, had won the prestigious UK's Economic and Social Research Council (ESRC's) post-doctoral research fellowship grant (of about £68,000).

This post-doctoral fellowship award enabled Professor Nudzor to attend national and international conferences to disseminate the findings of his doctoral research through conference presentations, policy dialogues, development of policy briefs, and other user-engagement seminars, workshops, fora and academic publications. Essentially, this post-doctoral award served a useful purpose in offering him the opportunity to deepen understanding of the constraints to implementing Education for All (EFA) policy initiatives among stakeholders in low-income countries. In particular, his doctoral and post-doctoral activities served to unmask the socio-economic, geo-political, discursive and context-specific issues that act as barriers to policy change in Ghana and other sub-Saharan Africa countries, and has shown ways by which these issues could be conceptualized for mediation.

Prof. Nudzor's other areas of research and expertise include: critical education policy analysis; teachers' professional development; foundational learning; and qualitative research methods. The rest concern management and leadership issues in education, educational decentralization; change management in educational institutions; activity-based learning (ABL) practices in low-income contexts; and research concerning the group of young people referred to in policy terms as not in education, employment or training (NEET).

Prof. Nudzor has extensive knowledge and experience in leading research projects and delivering on expected project objectives and outcomes. Currently, Professor Nudzor is leading IERIS to collaborate with Transforming Teaching, Education and Learning (T-TEL), Ghana, Kayman and Umory University to conduct a hundred thousand (USD 100,000.00) Google Research sponsored randomize control trial to improve the writing skills of senior high students in thirteen schools across Ghana using AI. Quite recently (i.e. in 2023).

Professor Nudzor had also worked as a Research Lead on the DeliverEd Research Project (A joint initiative of IEPA, Education Commission, the University of Oxford, the University of Toronto and the National Education Reform Secretariat of the Ministry of Education, Ghana) to explore the delivery approaches being used by Ghana's Ministry of Education to deliver better educational outcomes for learners.


